# JUNIOR CAMPUS Preschool

This term the Dolphins and Turtles have been investigating the life cycle of Bogong moths, what has happened to them and why they are now on the endangered list. We learnt how important the Bogong moth was to First Nation's people as a food source and a signal of the change of seasons. There is an app tracker put up by Victoria's Zoos where you can upload photos of moths so they can be tracked. Moth Tracker (swifft.net.au)

Extending on from the Bogong Moths the Dolphins and Turtles researched and learnt how First Nation's people use natural resources in everyday life and look after the land. We harvested bark from the ironbark tree in our playground to create dye. This dye was used in a variety of art works including the dot collage on Grand friends' Day.

Some children were interested in learning how to use the dye to change the colour of material. We watched a video on natural dying highlighting an Indigenous artist, Katie West. The Turtles learnt how to prepare calico with soy milk, ready to be dyed using vegetation we found in our playground.











This term the Penguin group started learning about 'Change'. They inquired into what they notice in their world that changes over time. A favourite activity was looking at our baby pictures and noticing how much we have all changed.

The Canberra Museum and Gallery provided us with a learning kit called 'Old MacDonald'. Through this inquiry we observed very old pictures of Canberra, explored how objects for everyday life had evolved over time, to deepen our understanding of time and change. A particularly interesting experience was comparing how butter was made in the past using a butter churner, and then exploring more modern technologies. We then made our own butter using both the old and newer technologies. We applied our new skills from this to bake biscuits for our Grandparents and Grand friends.

We have also investigated spiders and other insects. This idea came from the children, after they noticed some spiders and insects around our preschool environment. Everyone has been learning a lot about spiders, looking closely at spiderwebs and using these designs to inspire some artworks and creating insect hotels.

During this term the children have also concluded their Kindy visits and continued to interact with their buddies each Friday afternoon.

### **English**

We have had a strong focus on developing students' writing this term. To develop their understanding of story writing, students have been learning about the structure and language features used in fairy tales. They have had lots of fun acting out well known fairy tales such as *The Three Little Pigs* and *Little Red Riding Hood* with their classmates and with puppets. Students have learnt that stories have a beginning, middle and end and have had a go at brainstorming their own ideas for stories and creating and writing their own fairy tales.







### **Maths**

This term students have been learning about measuring capacity. This has involved hands on experiences of measuring, comparing and ordering the capacity of bowls, cups and drink bottles. Students have also consolidated their knowledge of 2D shapes, location and addition.





We know how important it is to have a balanced diet and exercise to stay fit and healthy.







In English and history we have looked at how Indigenous Australians use stories to teach us about how they believe the world was created. We have been using our ICT skills to create our own digital Indigenous texts.

It is hard to believe that we are so close to the end of the year! As always, Purple Unit has been a busy place, full of learning and fun. Watching the progress the students have made over the past four terms has been wonderful.

This term we have worked hard to spend more time in our mainstream classrooms to support our social skills. We are enjoying making new friends and learning in different spaces with other teachers. We are becoming more independent learners and are excited when we have an opportunity to learn something new.

We have also been practising our turn taking and fair play skills during group times with board games. We are learning the importance of rules and why we need to stick to them when playing. We are also working hard to remember when it is our turn and why we need to share with others.

We also had our first Christmas concert as a class and it was incredible. We were very excited to get on stage and did an amazing job singing our songs in front of such a big crowd.

To finish the term we are taking off on a trip around the world, to learn about different countries and their celebrations. We have visited Germany, China, Mexico, Thailand and France. We love finding each country on the map and learning about their lives and traditions. We are also very excited when we get to cook and try some food from each culture.

Mini Fair was a fun and memorable day. Our 5&6 students helped to plan and run the stalls and our junior students had lots of fun visiting each stall. Our favourites were ice cream, sponge throwing and mini golf.

It has been a fabulous year in Purple Unit. We would like to say a big thank-you to our parents and carers for all of your support this year. We have loved our time together in Purple Unit and could not be prouder of what we have achieved together.









### **STEM**

We have had an amazing end to 2022 in STEM. K - 6 students have continued to expand their knowledge of how to use digital technologies to explore and explain their world.

Kindergarten students continued to explore the use of digital technologies. The term started with students learning about cybersafety and relating it partly to 'stranger danger'. The difference being that you can't always recognise the danger. They then spent time learning how to think like a robot. This was done initially through using the school's Beebots then using Scratch Junior on the iPads. This proved to be highly engaging with students using how to program by dragging symbols. Scratch Junior also allowed them to make recordings and take photographs. These were then incorporated into the Scratch programs they created.

LSU students undertook a similar range of learning to the above. Older students had the option of using Chromebooks to access the standard version of Scratch plus share information about a topic of their choice in Google Slides.

Year 1/2s started the term by exploring what the phrase being cybersafe means. This included being 'stranger danger' aware on the Internet and knowing what to do if they see 'unsafe material'. They learnt how to use Google slides to display data such as the results of a survey they conducted as a graph. Students then investigated the concept of algorithmic or step by step thinking through the use of the Scratch program. This included making sprites move, the use of backgrounds, and deliberately distorting the sprite.

Year 3/4 students have used digital technologies to explain their world. This included learning how to safely collect, interpret and display information about a topic they were passionate about. Some topics included lions and kelpie puppies. The information they collected was 'published' using Google Slides. These Google slides were shared with other students via each STEM Google Classroom. Students then used Google Forms to collect other students' views about the information they have shared. This included what other students found interesting about their slides and any wonderings they had. Students then spent time expanding their algorithmic skills using Scratch. This may have included using broadcast blocks, used visual effects or including music.

### **SENIOR CAMPUS**

**English** 



This term, *Year 7* have been learning all about news. We began by investigating the history of news, and all the technological advancements that have occurred to make the modern, non-stop news we have today possible. For their major task, they created news broadcasts that were based on topics of their choice. Some include: The Dangers of Vaping, The Tragic Death of Steve Irwin, Why Netflix Shouldn't Have Ads, and The AFL Draft Picks for 2023. After filming, we spent a lot of time editing these videos to ensure they resembled the professional broadcasts we see on TV. Some screenshots from these fabulous broadcasts can be seen below.







For *Year 8* English the term started with students continuing their study and exploration of advertising. Building off the analytical skills that they cultivated toward the end of Term 3, this term saw students flexing their creative muscles through the creation of their own advertising campaign. Students were able to choose any product that they wished and had to create an in-depth campaign to launch their product. This allowed students to create a range of advertisements, from posters to TV ads, as well as a detailed campaign timeline and specific information about their product packaging, with some students even creating accompanying websites. This culminated in a 'pitch', where students had to showcase and 'sell' their product to the class. After the completion of the advertising unit, we segued back into exploring our identity, by starting a self-expression unit. Students were welcome to create any piece of 'art' that expressed something about themselves, which they in turn explained through the creation of a written rationale. Through this unit poetic, literary and artistic techniques were examined and utilised in order to explore the way that individuals in society express ideas about themselves and the world around them.

### HaSS









Year 7 students are studying inclusiveness and what makes cities liveable. They have been examining the criteria for why people migrate between places, how we categorise liveability using the Global Liveability Index, and how city streets can be modified to make them into shared spaces. They have also explored Canberra's liveability by studying crime statistics and considering the value of the spaces around them. Year 7 has finished the term with an investigation into inclusiveness and accessibility by designing their own playground for the school, taking into account different types of play such as active, social and the many sensory ways children can interact with play equipment and each other.

**Year 9** have been busy studying the Great War of 1914-1918. They began by examining the makeup of a trench, including their own physical trench run activity, and the role the Gallipoli campaign played in the history of the ANZAC legend in Australia. They then turned their attention to a specific soldier or nurse and have been using the Australian War Memorial archives to research primary sources, everything from diaries, photos, after action reports and Red Cross "missing or wounded" files, to learn about their experiences in the Great War. They will finish the term by taking a look at the propaganda posters that were created to convince Australians to support the war effort.



The **9/10 elective history** class has been examining the storytelling power of Cold Cases, examining why they are often considered so fascinating and how they impact the history of people and places. They have each studied a cold case or mystery, examined and analysed evidence, read several theories about their case, and determined whether they would personally discount any theories or have come up with theories of their own. This study culminates with a creative response in the form of a "case file", including popular items such as newspaper clippings, suspect photographs, maps and other material. They will finish the term by playtesting some of the Wanniassa themed board games they created last term, particularly Monopoly and Cluedo, which they hope to polish and gift to the school.

### SENIOR CAMPUS

### **Learning Support**

(Small Group Program)

Year 8 English did a study of letter writing and grammar. We read the book Black Cockatoo and did research on the symbolism of totems and how they would be different based on people living in the city or the country. We individualised the task by looking at what animal was important to each student. In Year 9/10, we read the novel The Giver and wondered what it would be like to live in such a structured, routine-based society – do the benefits make up for the challenges? We have also been editing different texts and looking at how punctuation changes the context and meaning of a piece of writing. In addition, some of the Year 9s have been getting a head start on their drivers' licences by working through the Pre-Learner Licence Course on Thursdays. It's great to think about the responsibilities that come with driving a car and we are excited to learn the rules and get out on the road!

We aim to end the year on a high in our English classes. The Year 7's have been reviewing word types: from nouns and adjectives to verbs and adverbs to pronouns and prepositions. We practised using adjectives to make comparisons, used command verbs to follow a recipe and bake biscuits and followed directions on a map to find school, the skatepark and a friend's house.





**Year 7** have been focusing on liveability this Term. As part of this, students have brainstormed and designed their own shopping centre layout (including the need for meeting places, toilets and recreation

Some Year 7 students have been visiting parks around Canberra to evaluate their design and suitability. We explored International best practice and discovered shopping centres including ice skating rinks, small rides and even a canal! Students identified the need for accessibility, a range of equipment and well maintained grounds as important design considerations.

In small groups we are currently developing our mega-diorama ideas.

One group has elected to present a mega-city (including roads, rail and high-rises) with the other group developing a rural setting (one side representing a polluted world, and another representing a pristine rural community).

We are currently completing a tourism unit, exploring the types of tourism (e.g. Eco-tourism). Students were fascinated by exploring the pros and cons of tourism in Antarctica as we viewed live webcams from the Australian Scientific Research stations. In the final weeks we will conclude this topic, researching space tourism and what tourism

in the future might look like. We will continue to

Year 9/10 Small Group HASS

The Small Group Program have been engaging in a variety of curriculum-based Maths activities throughout the term, with a focus on real-world applications. Students have been using protractors to measure angles. They have also been using their knowledge of the properties of angles to solve problems around shapes, points and areas. Students have been learning how to transform shapes by moving, flipping and enlarging them over mirror lines and within grid systems. They have been investigating how to compare items for sale, to ensure they spend their money in the best way, while taking into consideration such things as getting the best unit price, buying quality items and avoiding waste. Overall, our students have had a great year in Maths, demonstrating a fantastic attitude towards learning new concepts, tackling challenges and getting on with the job.





During the term. Year 7 LS Science students learnt about First Nations Astronomy and seasonal gardening. The students studied the language, culture, custom and ceremonies that were initiated by the night sky and how these stories shaped the lives of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Inslader people. The students created their own constellation which had significant meaning to them or their family. During the seasonal gardening unit of work, students investigated the impact that the seasons and weather conditions have on growing fresh produce and researched optimal growing conditions for fruit and vegetables.

Life skills 101 - Teamwork, communication, problem solving, critical thinking, and creativity are all on the menu when our team gets together. Students produced some amazing meals this year including pasta and pasta bakes, burgers, pizzas, bread, bread rolls, dumplings, soups, burritos, wraps, nachos, wedges and stir fries.

Due to the most amazing skill set in the school, students were even asked to cater for the year 6 transition days. What a marvellous group of learners.

### Westwood Farm - Lions Club Youth Haven

Students from our small group program have been visiting the scenic Westwood farm on Kambah Road every Wednesday. Students are picked up and dropped off kindly by the Lions club volunteers.

Students engaged in some fantastic activities including tending to the garden beds and often harvesting a garden salad for lunch. Everyone is involved in preparing morning tea, lunch and perhaps the least favourite part, cleaning up.

A day at the farm starts with a check in and planning for the day ahead. Students all share the responsibilities and quickly learn what the animals need. There are alpacas, cows, sheep, donkeys and chickens to be cared for including cuddling and feeding. Students do a lot of walking and exploring and on our last exploration we found a big dam surrounded by native wildflowers.

On days when the weather is cold and wet the group starts the day with a hot chocolate and lights the fire to keep warm. Students have a choice of what they might like to do next including activities like weaving, rock painting, studying bones, talks about foraging and indigenous plant use. It is always fun to check on the egg incubator as students wait for the baby chickens to hatch!

Students and Wanniassa School staff are very grateful for the wonderful opportunity to participate in this program and for the generosity of the Lions Club and Westwood Farm for hosting us.











Students in the small group program for science have enjoyed an exciting year. Students learned about growing plants and the best medium for germination. A couple of growing lights and pods were purchased, and the seeds germinated quickly in comparison to growing either in the garden or in a glass jar. Students weeded gardens, dug up carrots and beetroot. Carrots were eaten fresh from the garden whilst beetroot was roasted and tasted. Every week students tasted a new item from the grocery store to expand palettes and determine if something is sweet, salty, sour, bitter, sour, cool, hot or umami. Delicacies such as pickled cucumbers, tuna, sardines, olives and different types of chocolate were all sampled and judged.





During science students explored micro-organisms and grew their own mould on slices of bread. They exposed bread slices to a huge variety of places and items including toilet taps, keyboards, garbage bins and basketballs to determine where germs live. Students also grew their own microorganisms (yeast) with amazing results.





Earlier in the year students learned about a particular energy – static electricity. Students made informed hypotheses, conducted experiments, and explored the data collected. Such fun!







# SENIOR CAMPUS **ARTS & Technology**



This term the 7/8 Music students have been learning how to read and write music. The students completed a short theme and variation composition using the C pentatonic scale.

They also worked on songs of their choice on a variety of instruments.











The 9/10 Music students have been learning about rock music. They completed a composition writing their own chord progressions and melodies, analysed some rock songs and learned how to perform a song of their choice. Many students were able to learn multiple songs.

Year 8 Design Technology students have experienced an introduction to both wood and metal design through experimenting with different hand tools, techniques and design processes. Students have completed different projects including a wooden pencil box with a sliding lid and using sheet metal to produce a dog or an elephant.

Year 9/10 Design - Metal: Over the course of this semester our students have produced a variety of different objects. We started off with an old-fashioned dust pan before launching into a range of different projects including their very own Brazier fire pit and Billy-cart!

This year student have made; pens, wind chimes, candle holders, decorations and trinket boxes just to name a few. Thank you, Wood Craft Guild, for having us!










## Term one with YWCA Canberra
