Dear Wanniassa School Families

Term 1 has certainly been a big and busy time, with so many things happening over the last 10 weeks. Both campuses have been buzzing with learning opportunities in core curriculum areas, as well as rich opportunities through art music, languages, sporting clinics, collaborative play, hands-on learning activities, lunchtime clubs, and even school discos. The Senior Campus upgrades are well underway and it will be terrific to use these new learning spaces when the project is completed. Enrolments for 2024 will open after the holidays. 








JC Music News


Week 10, Term 1, 2023 **JUNIOR CAMPUS Preschool**










We have had many shared learning experiences including researching about Penguins, creating collaborative art pieces, developing graphs to learn about each other, singing, stories, and collaborative games.

Kindergarten







What a great start everyone in Kindergarten has made to school. We are amazed by the children's eagerness to learn and their adjustment to school routines.

Our focus in Term 1 is on fostering a love of reading and text construction, which occurs through daily reading routines, weekly library sessions, and modelled writing experiences. We are using the online reading program, Reading Eggs, to support our letters and sounds program. Each day students read with their teacher to understand the sound that each letter makes and blend these sounds to read words.

Home reading has started with levelled books that are short, predictable texts containing high frequency words and common sound patterns that are easy to sound out. Reading these books more than once will help your child to become more familiar with the text and develop fluency when reading.

In Mathematics students have participated in hands on activities to develop their understandings of Number. This has included identifying dot patterns up to 10, recognising numbers and quantities, playing dice games and counting forwards and backwards. We have also investigated shapes and patterns this term.

The students have really enjoyed their gross motor sessions where they have built as well as fostered and enriched their physical and social skills of negotiating, sharing, and collaborating with a variety of their peers.







Blue Unit Years 1 & 2

In Term 1, Kindergarten to Year 4 students have been exploring rhythm through dance using the Every Chance 2 Dance program which is a Canberra based, curriculum-aligned resource. We have been exploring ways to use our bodies to move in rhythm to music and choreograph dance moves together. One of the favourite aspects of the lesson is the "Show your Moves" part where individual children can show the class their groovy dance moves. The classes are a lot of fun with masses of excitement and laughter blended into our learning.

It is hard to believe that the first Term is nearly over. Blue Unit has been working very hard this term. They have settled into their new classes and expectations and have produced some quality work across all areas of the curriculum. It is also really good to see the students making new friends.

We had a visit from Constable Kenny Koala. They spoke to the children about how they can be safe in the community and what to do if they lose parents/carers at the shops. Year 1 /2 hosted a very successful assembly in Week 6. They sang songs and read their stories showcasing their writing abilities.

Blue Unit Continued


Blue Unit celebrated Harmony week with discussions and activities around the subject.

In Science we have been learning about how animals and plants provide for us. We have learnt that bees make honey and pollinate flowers to make fruit. They have also learnt that the cacao tree produces pods which we use to make chocolate!

Yellow Unit has been busy throughout Term One. Yr 5B & Yr 6S have been working with visitors from the Canberra Raiders and the Brumbies to develop future NRL and Rugby Union players. These clinics focused on developing different skills and having fun.

Yellow Unit was excited to have a visit from Constable Kenny Koala in Week 7. Kenny spoke to Year 5 & 6 students about how we can stay safe in our community, online, and while using social media. It was fantastic discussing with Kenny all the different ways we can keep ourselves safe.









This Term Year 5B and Year 6S have been investigating why plants and animals develop different adaptations. After some research, Year 5B started to investigate why plants in different environments develop adaptations to help them to survive. Year 6S have been conducting their own research into animals and the adaptations they develop to help them to survive. Year 5B have been exploring the school and looking for plants that have had to adapt to different environments. They are now starting to create diagrams of some of the different plants we have found around Wanniassa School.







This Term Yellow unit has been working hard. For mathematics, Year 5B and 6S have been looking at a range of different strategies to help them to solve addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division problems.

For literacy, Year 5B and Year 6S have been working on developing their narrative and persuasive writing skills. Yellow Unit has had a fantastic start to the Year!

Purple Unit has had a great start to the year and we can't believe it is already Week 10! In literacy we have been working hard to write detailed recounts and narrative texts. We have worked to reread our writing and edit it for capitalisation, punctuation, and correct spelling.

Each morning we have a session to work on our gross motor skills. This term we have participated in skipping, pool noodle drumming, basketball, cricket, and playground skills.

In maths, we began the year with a focus on counting and place value skills. We are now learning time and calendar concepts. Some students are learning about the times in our day and days of the week, while others are learning to tell time to the hour and half-hour or to the quarter hour, 5 minutes, or minute.

Learning Support

(Small Group Program)









HaSS -In Year 7, we have been investigating the Ancient World with a focus on Ancient Egypt! Learning about the mummification process was a huge highlight for our class, with the opportunity to make mummies using modelling clay and then transform some of our student volunteers into walking mummies. Our attempts to mummify fruit were not as successful as our Nitrite solution was watered down with an unexpected downpour. We have researched amulets, learnt about the sarcophagus and the parts of the Pyramid. As the Term concludes, our attention will be turned to Egyptian gods, food and housing. Congratulations year 7 on your transition to High School!



Year 7 English have been hard at work writing recounts, and exploring procedures.

A highlight for most of the class was creating a procedure for making fairy bread (of course eating it was the best part). We followed a procedure for making paper planes with some flying the length of the corridor! Persuasive writing has also been a focus of our learning, with students writing persuasive texts about a range of subjects (for example that the school week should be shortened to 4 days). We will start our novel study in the last week of what has been a very big, busy and successful Term! Thanks Year 7!





Science- experiment in the science labs: Follow a procedure, staying safe and working as a team.

In *Year 8 English* we have been practising our literacy skills. We have been doing this through creative writing, making comic strips, note taking using graphic organisers, and through comprehension tasks. Another focus in year 8 English has been to build social connections and practise how we speak to our friends. Awesome job Year 8!








Science- learning the names of different tools in science labs.

In *History* this Term, *Year 10* have been engaged with learning about World War II. As part of this unit we have identified the significant events and created a timeline for reference and display. Students have completed independent research into the Allies and Axis powers and the leaders and mapped the countries involved in the war. We have investigated the role of Women in World War 2 and have been analysing posters and propaganda. This week we are turning our attention to rations in WW2 looking at some primary and secondary sources to support our learning. Awesome work Year 10!










HaSS - This term **Year 9** students have focused on the causes and effects of the Industrial Revolution - with particular focus regarding people's movements and how the increased use of machinery changed lives. Further to this, the students have also prepared food for the school community every Tuesday serving meals such as burritos, curried sausages, fried rice and seasoned potato wedges.

English - This term in **Year 9** Small Group English, we have been learning about informative texts. We have studied brochures, news articles, documentaries, and resumes as we have learnt how to distinguish fact and opinion in a variety of texts. Once we had a solid understanding of what an informative text was, we started our deep dive into conspiracy theories. After looking at documentaries, podcasts, and conducting our own research about Denver Airport and the Bermuda Triangle, students picked a conspiracy theory that they were most interested in researching. From there we used both fact and opinion to explain what the deal is with the Loch Ness Monster, the Earth being hollow, and then tried to convince people that the Illuminati is controlling all of us. Great job everyone!

Science - This term in **Year 9** Small Group Science we have been learning about Chemistry. We started off by recapping the different states of matter, how they change and the particle theory. We then moved on to what chemicals are and what they are made of. The class enjoyed looking through the Periodic Table in this unit to see all of the different elements. For their assignments, students put together a sales pitch for an assigned element that we then sold in a class auction! Great work Year 9!







SENIOR CAMPUS

English

This Term, each *Year 7 English* class completed a novel study. Ms Brak's class studied 'Boy' by Roald Dahl, Ms Kerrie's class studied 'Coraline' by Neil Gaiman, and Ms William's class studied 'The Tale of Despereaux' by Kate DiCamillo. We have had a lot of fun learning about either the fantasy worlds in 'Coraline' and 'Despereaux' or about what life was like as a teenager 100 years ago in 'Boy'.

Kerrie's Year 7 English class studied the text 'Coraline' by Neil Gaiman this term. They read the novel and viewed the film, comparing and contrasting the two. The class worked incredibly hard all term. Some of the learning activities included:

- Recreating characters and settings in creative ways
- Creating new characters and stories using the themes and storyline of Coraline
- Learning how the film was made and then applying this knowledge to build and develop their own characters
- Writing comparative paragraphs about setting, storyline, character and theme
- Learning new note taking strategies
- Learning about sentence and paragraph structure
- Participating in an 'immersion experience' of entering into the 'other classroom' and experiencing literature in action! (yes, there was crawling on the floor and the teacher did get dressed up!)

What an amazing start to Year 7 these students have had! Please enjoy some of the photos of our students and a tiny sample of their fantastic work.













Year 8 have focused on their creative writing and thinking skills this term. Kerrie's class have studied 'Red Dog', reading the novel and viewing the movie before completing their own story writing task. Errol's class considered 'Personal Narratives' producing some incredible work about their own experiences. Mr Harrison's class has been studying survival stories and created their own imaginative writing in this genre.

In *Year 9* English, Ms Williams and Ms Brak's classes were introduced to the dark and mystical world of William Shakespeare's 'Macbeth'. We began by learning about the historical context of the 1600s when the play was written, before undertaking an in depth study of the play. We then summarised our learning by completing an in-class essay. We will finish the term with various creatives tasks. Ms Brak's students will either create a music playlist, podcast or video review to summarise their final thoughts on the play. Errol's class has been studying documentaries, with a particular focus on issues facing Indigenous Australians. This culminated in students writing about a social issue that they found important. They then used this information to create their own documentaries about the social issue.

In *Year 10* English Errol's class has been studying the graphic novel 'Maus', which has been directly aligned with their studies in HASS. Students used their knowledge of this text to create their own short story or comic about a social issue or event in history that they thought was important. Students then used their understanding of the novel to write a persuasive essay that addresses themes and ideas of the graphic novel.

HaSS



Our **Year 7** HaSS classes have been studying Ancient Civilisations and have been working hard on several assessments! So far, students have learned how to analyse a number of primary sources and have debated the ethics of displaying mummies in museums around the world. Their final assessment for this term is to create their own ancient artefacts, so watch this space in Term 2 for examples of student work!

The **Year 8** HaSS classes have been travelling through time to the Middle Ages, exploring texts, paintings, and ideas from the period. Students have just completed a major assignment on the Black Death, and the many ways that this impacted life in Europe.

Year 9 HaSS classes have been working hard looking at various aspects of the Industrial Revolution in Britain. This was a period of immense change, not just in technology but in how society was structured. They will be finishing off the term by looking at primary sources from the period before we move on to study the First World War.

The **Year 10** HaSS classes have been studying the Second World War, with a large focus on primary sources from POW and concentration camps. On Friday of Week 6 the classes had an opportunity to get hands-on with primary sources, with artefacts loaned to the school from the Australian War Memorial. We are also lucky to have a member of the ADF Reserves in our faculty, who shared modern uniforms, maps, and ration packs with students. This allowed them to make comparisons with WWII era uniforms, badges, and technology.

SENIOR CAMPUS **STEM**





Year 7 students are learning about the different properties of matter. Students were learning about the density of sugar water with changed concentrations. Through trial and error, students used their scientific understanding, to stack the coloured solutions in order of density.



In Japanese, students have been practising hiragana in a variety of ways, learning new language particularly related to the classroom and using various online platforms to progress their language learning. We had a fun time dipping into Japanese culture by making yakisoba (fried noodles), both vegan and with

There was a tight race for our House Champions with points being earnt through participation and achievement in competitive and novelty events. The overall House Champions for the 2023 swimming carnival was the mighty Gingera with House Captains Lucy Kennedy-King, Max Richardson and David Levika demonstrating great house spirit throughout the carnival. Congratulations and thank you to all involved in making this an amazing first whole-school event of the year!





This term, the **Year 7 music** students have been working on their ability to read music notes and recognise different time values. Earlier in the term, they were introduced to a few elements of music, such as expression, tempo and style. The students will aim to transfer their theory learning to two practical assessments. Currently, the Year 7s are working on their composition assessment, for which they are writing an eight-bar melody using conventional music notation. Their final task for the term will be to perform a piece of music on a chosen instrument.

The **Year 9 and 10 elective music** students have been expanding their understanding of music from different periods, genres and cultures, alongside polishing their note reading and rhythmic skills. They had the opportunity to appreciate and write about Australian musicians and old-world musicians for a research project. Students are currently working on their first performance assessment, for which they are preparing one or more piece/s of music on their chosen instrument with an aim on expression and fluency.



SENIOR CAMPUS ARTS & Technology

Continued

This Term the *Year 9 & 10 Hospitality* students have been working through a Plan, Prepare and open the Cafe Assignment. The students have developed their barista skills using the espresso machine, coffee terminology, menu design and costing. As part of the assignment, groups of eight students have opened the cafe and served staff from their menus.

Further to this, every Thursday through '\$3 bowls', the Hospitality students have prepared and served the school community amazing meals such as pizza, spinach and feta gozleme, fried rice, and milkshakes. Some students also catered for the Junior School Principal's lunch that occurs each term, serving pizza, sausage rolls, and a range of small sweet treats!





The **Year 8 Food Technology** students have been developing their skills on reading recipes, equipment identification, safety and hygiene, and practical cooking skills. The cooking practicals have focused on breakfast and lunch items that are affordable and accessible to cooking at home.




During the Term, the *Year 9 & 10 Food Technologhy* students have explored a range of special occasions including social, cultural, religious, historical and family-based events. Students have prepared food that is representative of culture, and connections to culture, for example, butter chicken aegean lentil pasta and ANZAC biscuits. Further to this, students have focused on kitchen safety - including hygiene (personal and environment); safe knife handling skills; and safe and appropriate preparation of food.

Year 7 & 8 Design Technology students have been learning, developing, and refining their practical skills in the Wood and Metal Workshops over the past several weeks. Year 7 have been busy constructing their bottle openers, which incorporates cutting, filing, drilling, and sanding techniques. Year 8 have completed their timber pencil boxes and are now working on sharpening their skills in the Metal Workshop.





This Term, the **Year 9&10** students in the Wanniassa **Visual Arts** elective have been extending their skills with diverse artistic mediums such as acrylics, graphites, clay, and pencils. Students have open interpreted activities to promote individualism through customisable assessments. We also encourage positive wellbeing with a program to support students through art.



Year 9/10 Woodwork classes have been refining their skills and developing their understanding of processes across Term 1. Students completed a timber joint exercise, which included a Lap Joint, 45 Lap Joint, Saddle Joint, and a Mitre Joint. Students have now commenced their Foot Stool and are nearing completion.

Metalwork classes have completed their Tool Box, which included folding sheet metal and using pop rivets to join. Some students also chose to lathe their handle as shown below. Students have also begun using the Metal Lathe to produce their Centre Punches.


